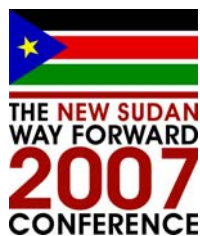

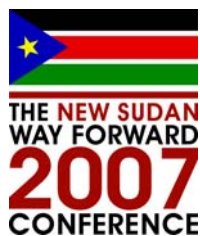

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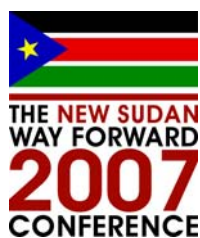

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Speakers

Sam Bell - Sam Bell is the Director of Advocacy for the Genocide Intervention Network. He graduated with honors from Swarthmore College in 2005. Sam has been featured in the Washington Post, New York Times, Houston Chronicle, The New Republic, and MSNBC. He has been a guest on CNBC. Sam also serves on the Save Darfur Coalition's Board of Directors.

Ted Dagne – Specialist in International Relations, Foreign Affairs, Defense, and Trade at the Congressional Research Service, the public policy research arm of the U.S Congress. Ted has also served as a Professional Staff Member for the House Foreign Affairs Committee and as Special Advisor to U.S. Special Envoy to Sudan and to the Assistant Secretary of State, Department of State. Ted has conducted over 2,000 major studies on African affairs and he is the Associate Editor of the Mediterranean Quarterly Journal.

Dr. Francis Deng - Special Adviser to the UN Secretary General for the Prevention of Genocide and Mass Atrocities. Before being appointed Special Advisor on May 29, 2007, Dr. Deng was Director of the Sudan Peace Support Project based at the United States Institute of Peace. He was also a Wilhelm Fellow at the Center for International Studies of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and a research professor of international politics, law and society at Johns Hopkins University Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies.

Before joining the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Dr. Deng was a Distinguished Visiting Scholar at the John Kluge Center of the Library of Congress. Dr. Deng served as Representative of the United Nations Secretary-General on Internally Displaced Persons (IDPS) from 1992 to 2004, and from 2002 to 2003 was also a senior fellow at the United States Institute of Peace.

Dr. Deng served as Human Rights Officer in the United Nations Secretariat from 1967 to 1972 and as the Ambassador of the Sudan to Canada, Denmark, Finland, Norway, Sweden and the United States. He also served as the Sudan's Minister of State for Foreign Affairs. After leaving his country's service, he was appointed the first Rockefeller Brothers Fund Distinguished Fellow.

He was at the Woodrow Wilson International Center first as a guest scholar and then as a senior research associate, after which he joined the Brookings Institution as a senior fellow, where he founded and directed the Africa Project for 12 years. He was also co-Director with Roberta Cohen of the Brookings Institution's Project on Internal Displacement which they founded to assist his mandate on IDPS. He was then appointed distinguished professor at the Graduate Center of the City University of New York before joining Johns Hopkins University.

Among his numerous awards in his country and abroad, Dr. Deng is co-recipient with Roberta Cohen of the 2005 Grawemeyer Award for "Ideas Improving World Order" and the 2007 Merage Foundation American Dream Leadership Award. In 2000, Dr. Deng also received the Rome Prize for Peace and Humanitarian Action.

Michael Ditchfield - Michael Ditchfield is the co-founder, President and Chief Executive Officer of The Sixteenth of May Foundation. Mr. Ditchfield is a best selling author, former professional athlete and accomplished speaker on the Third World. As a Goodwill Ambassador to Africa for Project C.U.R.E he has worked in Rwanda with the orphans of the 1994 genocide, establishing a branch of the Sports for Peace Foundation. He was also instrumental in bringing sports into Project Mercy in Ethiopia through the Cunningham Foundation. Mr. Ditchfield resides in Denver, Colorado and is a partner in JING Restaurant, which supports the efforts of The Foundation in the Sudan on a monthly basis. He will be documenting the rebuilding of Sudanese lives in a documentary and book with "Daniel" Deng Bol Aruei.



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Brian D'Silva – Brian D'Silva has over 25 years of experience working on Sudan issues and in Sudan. He served as Ford Foundation Visiting Professor at the University of Khartoum and also with USAID/Sudan in Khartoum in the 1980s. In the 1990's, he worked on Sudan issues from USAID's Regional Office in Nairobi. He served on USAID's Sudan Task Force from 2001 to 2005 and was also part of the US Government team in support of the Naivasha Peace Process. Brian is currently technical advisor managing USAID/USDA agreement on Sudan. He was a close personal friend and colleague of the late First Vice President of Sudan, Dr. John G DeMabior.

Ezekiel Gatkuoth – Head of Mission, Government of Southern Sudan Mission to the United States of America.

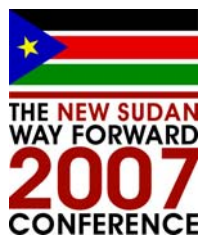
Ken Isaacs - Ken Isaacs currently serves as the Vice President of Programs and Government Relations for Samaritan's Purse, a Christian relief organization with activities in over 130 countries worldwide. In 2004, Mr. Isaacs accepted the position of Director of the Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance (OFDA) within the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), which oversaw U.S. humanitarian relief efforts in both Darfur and southern Sudan. Previous to his work at OFDA, Mr. Isaacs served as the International Programs Director for Samaritan's Purse for 17 years. In this capacity, he was responsible for establishing a hospital in Lui, Sudan, at the height of the civil war, providing desperately needed humanitarian aid to the people of Sudan's Nuba Mountains when they were under siege, and overseeing aid to the National Democratic Alliance of Eastern Sudan. Mr. Isaacs has over 22 years experience working in the relief and development community. He has testified before House and the Senate committees, including the House International Relations Committee, Subcommittee on Africa, Global Human Rights and International Operations.

Omer Ismail - Omer Ismail was born in the Darfur region of Sudan. He has spent over 20 years working both independently and with international organizations on relief efforts. Omer fled Sudan in 1989 as a result of his political views. He helped found the Sudan Democratic Forum, a think tank of Sudanese intellectuals working for the advancement of democracy in Sudan as well as co-founding the Darfur Peace and Development organization to raise awareness about the crisis in his troubled region. He currently works as Policy Advisor to several agencies working in crisis management and conflict resolution in Africa. He is a Fellow at the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University's Carr Center for Human Rights Policy.

Dr. Anne Itto – Advisor to the President of Government of Southern Sudan on Agriculture and Food Security. SPLM Deputy Secretary General for Southern Sudan.

Dr. Akec Khoc – Dr. Akec Khoc was born and raised in Bor, South Sudan. He graduated from Khartoum University Medical School (MB BS) in 1979 and was temporarily Deputy Director for Training in the Regional Ministry of Health, Juba, South Sudan (1982-1983.) He served as the Chief Medical Coordinator for the Sudanese Refugee Health Service at Gambella, Ethiopia and later become the Representative of the Sudan Peoples' Liberation Movement (SPLM) in France, where he continued with specialty medical studies and practiced in Clinical Pathology (Hematology.) Dr. Khoc was integrated into the Sudanese Diplomatic Service following the conclusion of the January 9, 2005 Comprehensive Peace Agreement. Currently he serves as the Deputy Permanent Representative of the Sudan to the United Nations in New York. He was awarded Ambassador for Peace in April 2007 by the Inter Religious Federation for World Peace.

Andrea Lari - Andrea Lari joined Refugees International in 2004 and has conducted missions for the organization to Sudan, the Great Lakes of Africa, Southern Africa and Colombia. In these missions, he has particularly focused on human security, humanitarian and protection needs of refugees and internally displaced persons. Before joining RI, Mr. Lari was a researcher for Human Rights Watch where he focused on Angola and forced displacement. Mr. Lari's career in humanitarian work began when he volunteered with Jesuit Refugee Service in Angola. He then served as their Country Director for Angola from 1998 to 2000 and conducted humanitarian needs assessments in Pakistan and Afghanistan in early 2002.



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Eric Longnecker - Eric Longnecker is an Export Policy Analyst in the Foreign Policy Division of the Office of Nonproliferation and Treaty Compliance in the Bureau of Industry and Security at the U.S. Department of Commerce. This office is responsible for implementing U.S. foreign policy controls and is the Commerce office responsible for controls on exports to terrorist-designated countries. In this capacity Mr. Longnecker processes export licenses for countries such as Sudan and Syria. He is also responsible for export policy issues for these countries and is the lead analyst for Sudan, Iran, Iraq, Burma, Venezuela and Libya issues.

Dr. Haruun Ruun Lual – Presidential Adviser in the Government of National Unity of Sudan

Parek Maduot – Parek, a native of Sudan, is a Construction Manager in the Northern Virginia area, with training as an engineer and superintendent from the University of Maryland at College Park. He had stints as a Field Engineer and Superintendent with the Turner Construction Company and as a Project Manager with Construction Dynamics Group, a division of the Arcadis Engineering Company. His most recent involvement with reconstruction work was as part of a team that conducted a feasibility study on a labor-based employment generation project in the three towns of Juba, Wau and Malaka. The feasibility study culminated in a broad project proposal submitted to USAID by Creative Associates International, and included plans to construct small residential settlements with efficient water and sanitation services fully integrated into the existing municipal infrastructure.

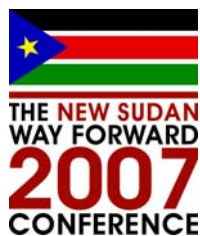
Dr. Hakim Moi - Hakim Dario N Moi, is the Executive Director of the Association for Media Development in South Sudan (AMDISS) which he and a number of media organisations serving Sudan help found in August 2003 in Nairobi, Kenya. AMDISS with its office based in Juba since June 2007, was conceived & formed in response to the pressing priorities for media development in South Sudan in the anticipated post conflict environment brought by the signing of the Comprehensive Peace Agreement (CPA) on 9th January 2005. Dr Moi lives and works in the UK in the financial services, media and telecommunications sectors. He has a keen interest in and is proactive about ICT infrastructure development in Southern Sudan's ten states, is currently actively exploring means and proposals for the Diaspora to contribute technical know-how and knowledge transfer to help develop and regenerate the economy of Southern Sudan through investment in communications & media development (ICT).

Joan Mower - Joan Mower is the public affairs officer at the Sudan Programs Group at the U.S. Department of State. She handles outreach efforts on Darfur and Sudan. Previously, she was director of international media training and development at the Broadcasting Board of Governors (BBG), the federal agency that handles all U.S. international broadcasting, including the Voice of America. A former Foreign Service Officer, she also served as BBG's communications coordinator. She began her career as a journalist, and worked as the bureau chief of *UPI* in Columbia, S.C., and for the *Associated Press* in Washington. She also ran the Freedom Forum/Newseum's programs for journalists in Africa and Latin America. She holds a B.A. from the University of California at Berkeley and an M.A. from Johns Hopkins University.

Deng Deng Nhial – Trade and Investment Officer, Government of Southern Sudan Mission to the United States of America.

Adam Szubin - Adam J. Szubin was named the Director of Treasury's Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) by U.S. Treasury Secretary Henry Paulson on August 1, 2006. In the role of OFAC Director, Szubin is responsible for administering and enforcing the United States Government's economic sanction programs to advance foreign policy and national security objectives. These programs target supporters of terrorism, proliferators of weapons of mass destruction (WMD), international narcotics traffickers, and select foreign countries.

Sunday Wani Taabu – Social, Culture and Consular Affairs Officer, Government of Southern Sudan Mission to the United States of America.



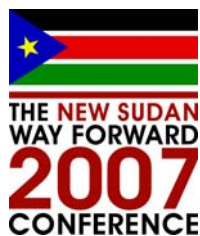
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Rev. Gloria E. White-Hammond, M.D. - Gloria White-Hammond has been the Co-Pastor of Bethel AME Church in Boston, MA since 1997 and a pediatrician at the South End Community Health Center since 1981. Dr. White-Hammond has worked as a medical missionary in several African countries including Botswana, Cote D'Ivoire and South Africa. Since 2001 Dr. Gloria has made seven trips into war-torn southern Sudan where she has been involved in obtaining the freedom of 10,000 women and children who were enslaved during the two decades long civil war. In 2002 she co-founded My Sister's Keeper, a humanitarian women's group that partners with women of Sudan in their efforts toward reconciliation and reconstruction of their communities. In February 2005, Dr. White-Hammond traveled into Darfur, western Sudan to listen and learn from female victims of genocide in Internally Displaced Persons camps. She recently served as the National Chairperson of the Million Voices for Darfur campaign and is the Co-Founder of the Massachusetts Coalition to Save Darfur.

Roger Winter – Roger Winter has worked on issues of peace, war, humanitarian assistance, civilian protection and democracy in Sudan - first as Executive Director of the nonprofit U.S. Committee for Refugees (1981-2001) and then as Assistant Administrator of USAID and as the Deputy Secretary of State's Special Representative on Sudan (2001-2006.)

Dr. Monica Pita Yugu, MD, MPH - University of Juba and OSLO. Dr. Yugu holds many other short term certificate courses on migration, mental health, gender, health service management, computer, HIV/AIDS education, counseling etc. from USA, Kenya, India and Sudan. She was Relief and Development Coordinator and Medical Coordinator for the Sudan Council of Churches for 15 years – organizing and coordinating IDP's healthcare with the Ministry of Health, UNICEF, HAC and other NGOS. She was the District Tuberculosis Coordinator for the internally displaced People in Sudan. She was also short term Health Consultant with World Health Organization, Nairobi, Kenya in 2001. Dr. Monica is a trainer, organizer, educator, counselor and emotional support provider to persons living with HIV/AIDS in Sudan and in the USA. She currently works as HIV Counselor at Hennepin County Medical Center, Minneapolis, Minnesota, USA.

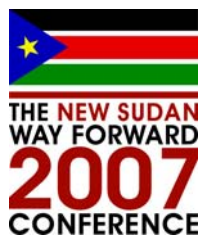

JUBA UNIVERSITY: EDUCATING LEADERS FOR A NEW SUDAN



Introduction

The idea of a university in Southern Sudan was first put forward by Southerners at the Round Table Conference on Southern Sudan in 1965. Nothing happened immediately. In 1971, the Arkweit Conference, which was held in Juba, recommended that the University of Khartoum should open a branch of its Extra-Mural studies in Juba. This was eventually started by the University in November 1975.

In the meantime by 1973, after the Addis Ababa Agreement, the Regional Government of Southern Sudan took the practical step by forming a University of Juba Project. Following this, President Gaffar Numeiry decreed the establishment of the University of Juba act on November 9, 1975 and concurrently established the college of Natural Resources and Environmental Studies and the College of Social and Economic Studies. In 1977 the Council of the University established the colleges of Education and Adult Education and Training. In 1978 the College of Medicine was established.

Mission

The mission of the University as stipulated in its act is to produce skilled manpower to meet the developmental needs of Southern Sudan and other rural areas of the country. This envisages the development of skilled manpower to rationally exploit the vast natural resources of the area in a sustainable way for development.

Strategy for Development of the University

In 1989, with the intensification of the war, the university was displaced to Khartoum where it has been for the past 16 years and has expanded from the original 5 colleges to 11 colleges and 5 centres. However with the signing of the Comprehensive Peace Agreement in January 2005, the University has embarked on a gradual/phased process of returning to its original home in Juba beginning in March 2007. This entails the return of selected colleges each year, starting with the first year. So far three colleges: Education, Rural and Community Development and Fine Arts, Music and Drama have started operating in Juba in 2007. In 2008, it is planned to move 4 science-based colleges – Applied Science, Engineering, Medicine and Natural Resources. In addition, 5 degree awarding Centres (Centre for Human Resources Development, Centre for Distance and Continuing Education, Centre for Peace and Development Studies, Computer Centre and Centre for Translation and Languages) are also planned to be moved. In 2009, the remaining colleges: Arts and Humanities, Law, Social and Economic Studies and the School of Management Studies will conclude the process of return. In the meantime, the remaining senior classes of the different colleges will continue to graduate in Khartoum.

Current and Anticipated Academic Programs

The University offers a range of academic programs which includes:

- Short courses
- Certificates (in computer studies, Adult Education, Librarianship and Education for Primary School Teachers),
- Diploma (in Computer Studies, Engineering, Laboratory Technology, Accounting, Economics Translation, Communication, Administration of Natural Resources, and Rural Development),
- Ordinary Degrees (in Education; Community Studies and Rural Development; Economics; Management Sciences; Art, Music and Drama; Law; Medicine; Languages and Translation),
- Honors Degree (in Natural Resources and Environmental Studies; Education; Economics; Arts and Humanities; Community Studies and Rural Development; Management Sciences and Engineering), and
- Postgraduate Diplomas (in Applied Linguistics, ELT,).



The required length of study ranges from one to five/six years.

Postgraduate Studies leading to Postgraduate Diploma, Masters and Doctoral Degrees are also available in the following fields: Natural Resources Environmental Studies; Arts and Humanities; Medicine; Economics; Management Sciences; Community Studies and Rural Development; Education; Languages and Translation; Applied and Industrial Sciences.

The academic year comprises of two semesters, each of 17 weeks duration. Courses are assessed during and at the end of each semester. The marks awarded to each course are a combination of semester examinations (70%) and of continuous assessment of course work (30%).

Common course (University Requirements) is provided for all colleges during the first year in four subject areas: English and Arabic Language; Sudan Foundation; Basic Mathematics and Computer Science.

Academic Programs approved by Senate and the University Council but awaiting implementation on return to Juba are a College of Petroleum Studies and Mining; College of Pharmacy, College Dentistry and School of Basic/Natural sciences. It is however anticipated that there will be a thorough restructuring and updating of the academic program as an aspect of the return process.

Faculty and Administration

The Management of the University is headed by the Vice Chancellor (Professor Sibrino Barnaba Forojalla), the Deputy Vice Chancellor (Professor Ayoub Khalil), and the Principal (Dr Wani Sule).



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Admissions Information

Undergraduate student admissions are made in the Admissions Office and are from four sources viz; national pool, least developed states, government sponsored (mature) intake and self-sponsored students.

Admissions requirements for certificates, diploma and higher diploma and other postgraduate studies are specified under the respective Colleges, Centres and Directorates.
